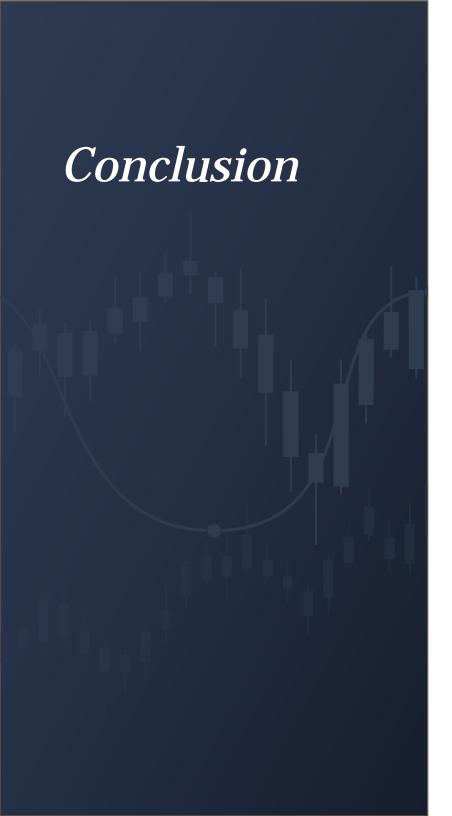

- Stock market signals are more positive than negative.
- Investors remain uncertain about the impact of Fed policy on the economy.
- The main risk remains the Fed has or will tighten too much, and a recession is looming in late 2023 and 2024.
- However, consumer and business balance sheets remain strong, so any slowdown would likely be mild.

S&P 500



- The S&P 500 shows a clear pattern of higher highs and higher lows since the bottom of October 2022.
- However, the S&P 500 is still off from it's all-time highs.
- If the bull market continues, expect new highs.

When the previous year is negative, and the first quarter of the subsequent year is positive, the rest of the year is positive 100% of the time by an average of 14.6%.

The S&P 500 is up about 2.4% since the end of Q1 as of 5/30/2023.

ACWI (All Cap World Index)



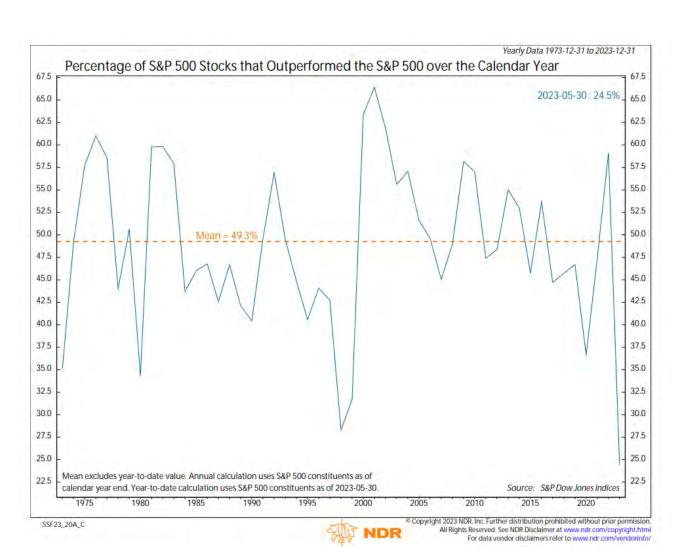
The ACWI shows a similar pattern as the S&P 500.

Narrow Leadership





Despite a strong pattern from the ACWI and S&P 500, the percentage of stocks outperforming the S&P 500 is only 24.5%.

Leadership is narrow.

More breadth to the upside would be healthier.

After periods of narrow leadership, small cap stocks have outperformed historically.

One year later, they have outperformed large cap stocks by a median of 7.6% and have outperformed large cap stocks 100% of the time.

Small Cap Stocks



- Narrow leadership is partly due to Silicon Valley Bank's (SVB's) collapse.
- Prior to this, small cap and mid cap stocks were outperforming large cap stocks.
- If the bull market were to continue, market breadth would likely increase.

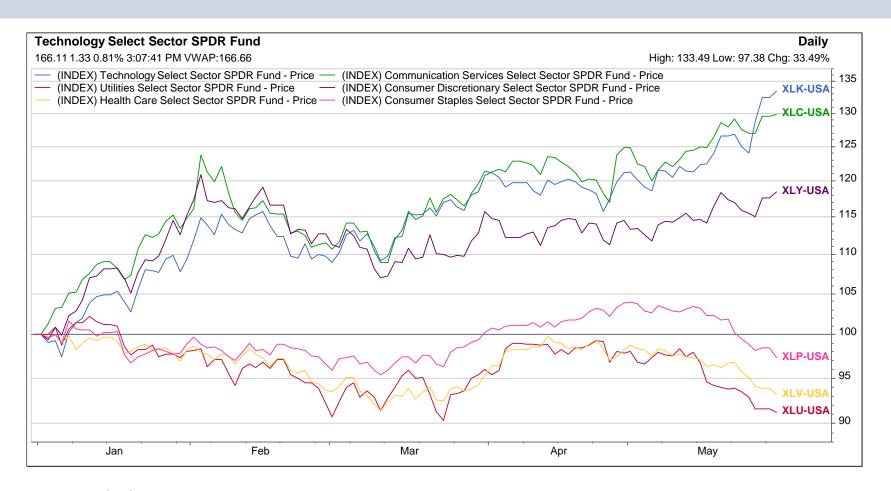

Sector Returns



- More economically sensitive sectors (Tech/XLK, Communication Service/XLC, and Consumer Discretionary/XLY) are outperforming less economically sensitive sectors (Consumer Staples/XLP, Healthcare/XLV, and Utilities (XLU).
- The stock market is a forward indicator, and this type of sector leadership signals investors believe the economy is on a positive trajectory.
- However, if the bull market were to continue, defensive sectors would likely need to participate more.

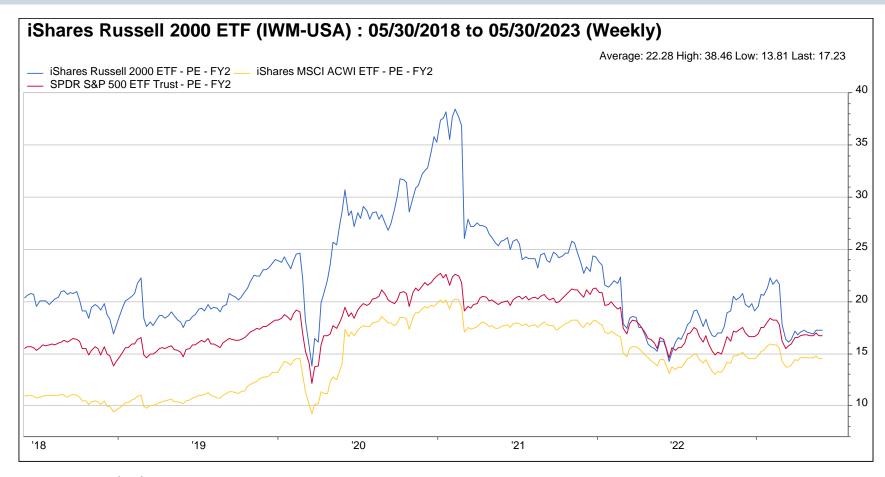

Valuations



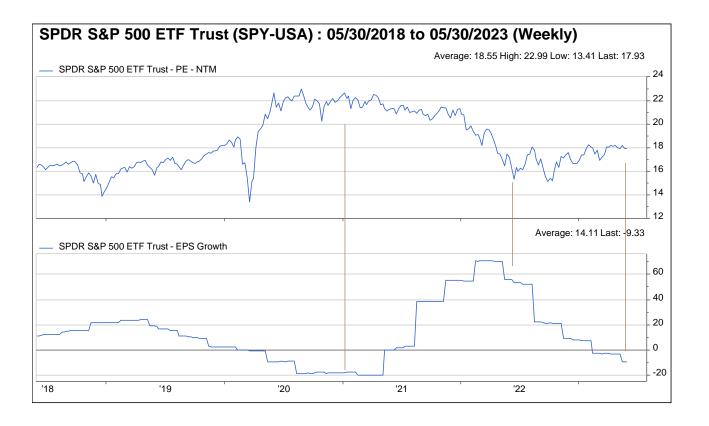
- Valuations look reasonable, especially for small cap stocks relative to large cap stocks.
- Price/Earnings (P/E) tends to be higher at earnings troughs than earnings peaks, and earnings revision signals are turning positive. (next two slides)

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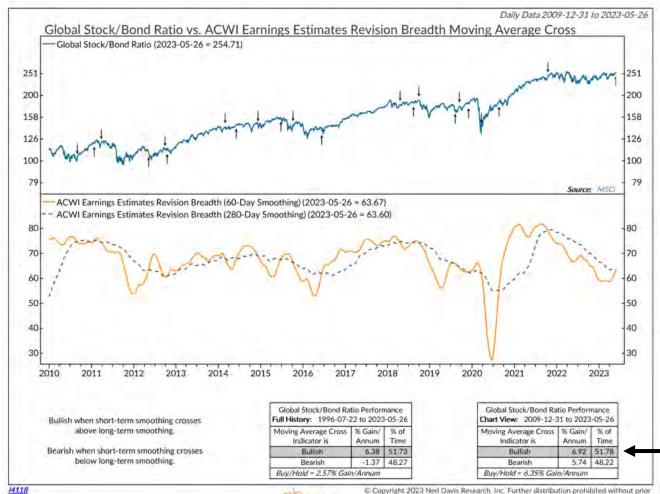

Historically, when earnings growth is between -20% and 5% the S&P 500 is positive 11.45% annualized since 5/31/2007, and positive 12.88% annualized since 3/31/1927.

Notably, the average P/E at earnings peaks is 14.38, and the average P/E at earnings troughs is 25.5.

Earnings





When there are more positive earnings estimate revisions in the last 60 days than there are over the last 280-days it has historically correlated with stock market outperformance versus bonds.

This is also a positive sign for the economy.

Companies would not guide higher if they were forecasting an increase in macro headwinds.

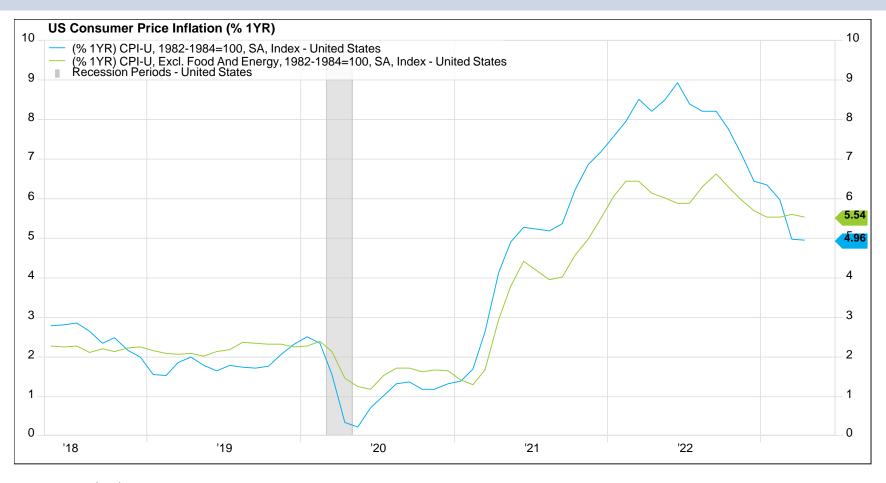

Inflation



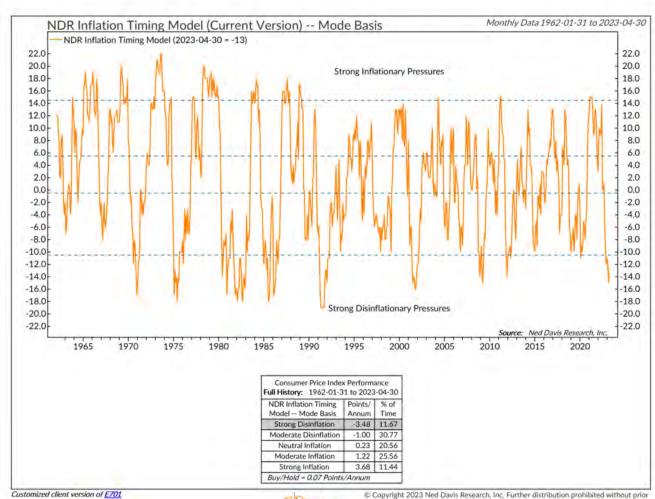
- Despite positive stock market signals, economic data remains uncertain.
- Inflation is on a downward trajectory, but the pace of that trajectory is unknown.

Inflation Timing Model





consists of 22 indicators that primarily measure the various rates of change of commodity prices, consumer prices, producer prices, and industrial production.

NDR Inflation Timing Model

It is in the strong disinflationary zone, where CPI declines by 3.48 points per-annum.

With core inflation at 5.5% currently, that implies we will hit 2% annual inflation again over the next year.

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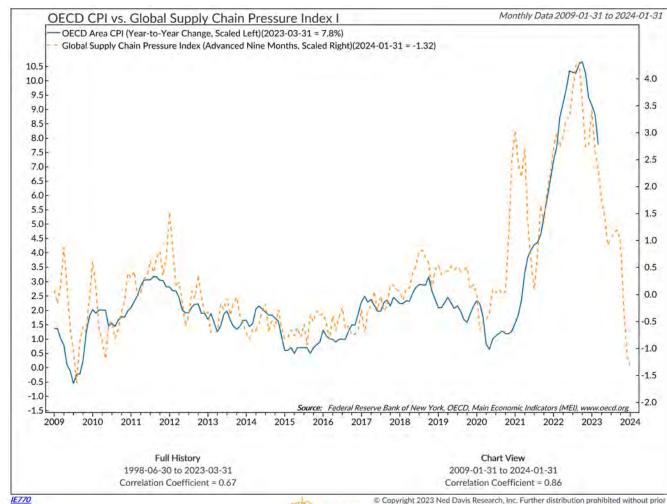

Supply Chains





Supply push inflation, which decreases GDP and increases prices, is now almost non-existent, according to this Global Supply Chain Pressure Index, which leads CPI by 9 months with a .86 correlation.

Therefore, continued inflation will be driven by demand pull inflation.

Unlike supply push inflation, demand pull inflation increases GDP and prices.

The Fed can control demand pull inflation much more than supply push inflation.

Published by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, the Global Supply Chain Pressure Index (GSCPI) is a composite of 27 indicators of supply chain pressure.

The Federal Reserve



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- If inflation remains on a downward trajectory, then the Fed can stop raising the FFR (Federal Funds Rate) and may even lower the FFR.
- Currently, investors expect the Fed to potentially increase the FFR one more time to 5.25-5%, then pause, and even lower the FFR by the end of 2023 or the beginning of 2024.

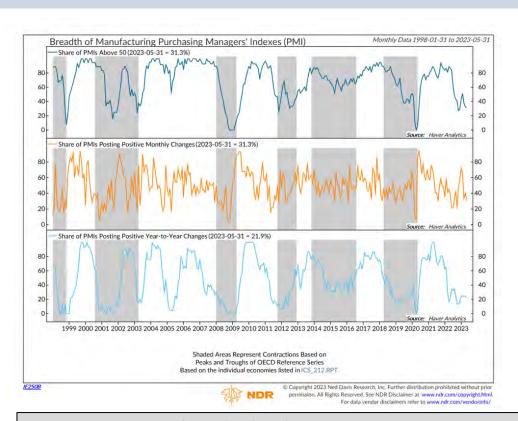
- Since inflation is mostly demand pull now, up revisions of the FFR would occur on economic strength. In this case, inflation would remain higher than expected.
- Down revisions of the FFR would occur on economic weakness. In this case, inflation would likely come down faster than expected.
- In either case, the Fed has room to go up or down based on the economy. This is not an unhealthy place for the Fed and the economy to be, despite a lot of negative media attention about the Fed.

PMI



- Negative economic trends along with falling prices may mean the Fed does not increase rates as expected at the next meeting.
- That could be a catalyst for markets.

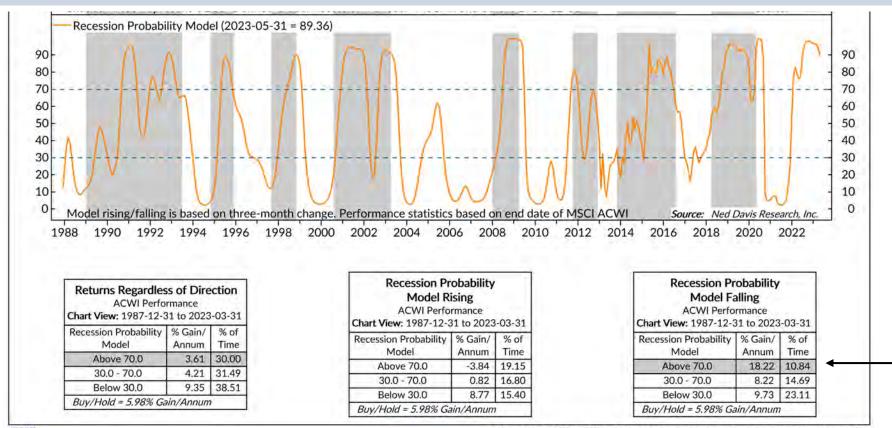
The Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) is a forward indicator meant to measure the prevailing direction of economic trends in the manufacturing and service sectors by taking a poll of various purchasing managers. A reading above 50 is considered expansion, and a reading below 50 is considered contraction.

Recession



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- This indicator implies the world was already in a recession or is in one now.
- When this indicator is in the high probability zone but falling, stock markets tend to outperform.

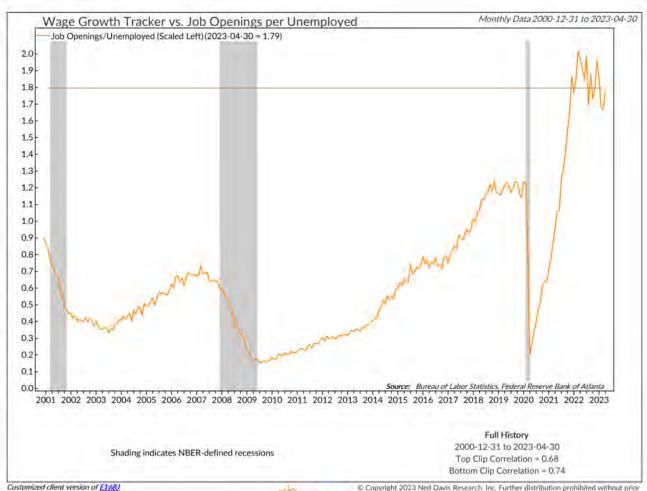

Employment Situation





There remains 1.8x the amount of job openings per unemployed in the U.S., suggesting there remains more demand than supply for labor, and unemployment conditions are likely to remain somewhat tight near term.

A tight labor market is supportive of economic growth.

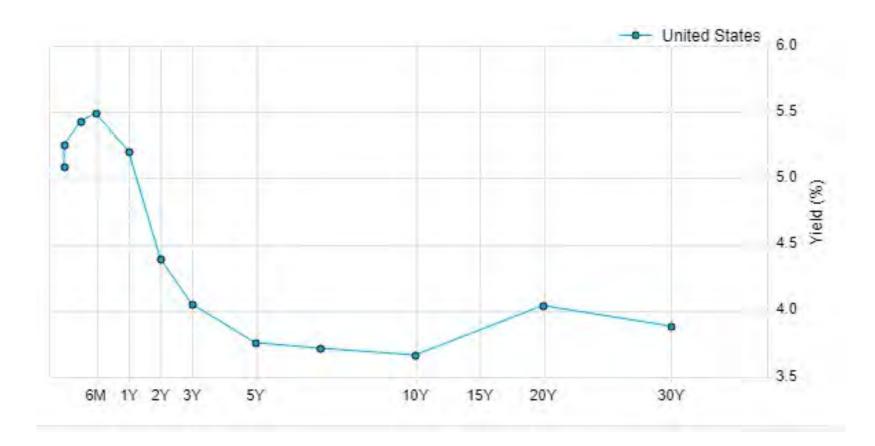

Yield Curve



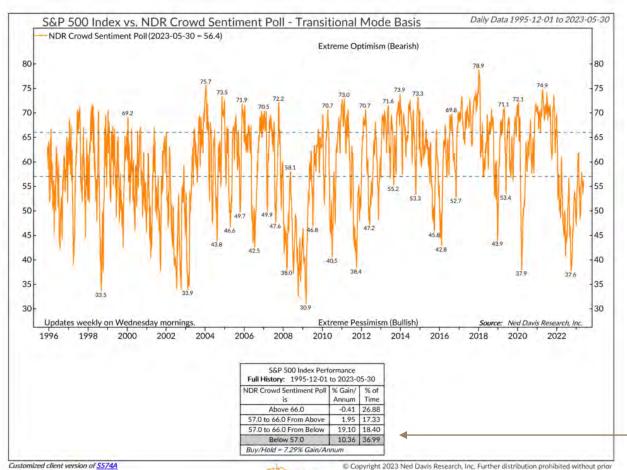
- The yield curve is inverted (short-term yields are generally higher than long-term yields).
- Historically this portends a recession.
- The yield curve is also a reflection of inflation expectations. Investors expect inflation to be high in the short-term and come down longer-term.

Sentiment





Lack of market breadth along with mixed economic data and the message from the yield curve has kept investors wary of investing in stock markets.

That fear is reflected in NDR's Crowd Sentiment Poll.

Historically, the best time to buy is when there is fear and anxiety as reflected in this poll.

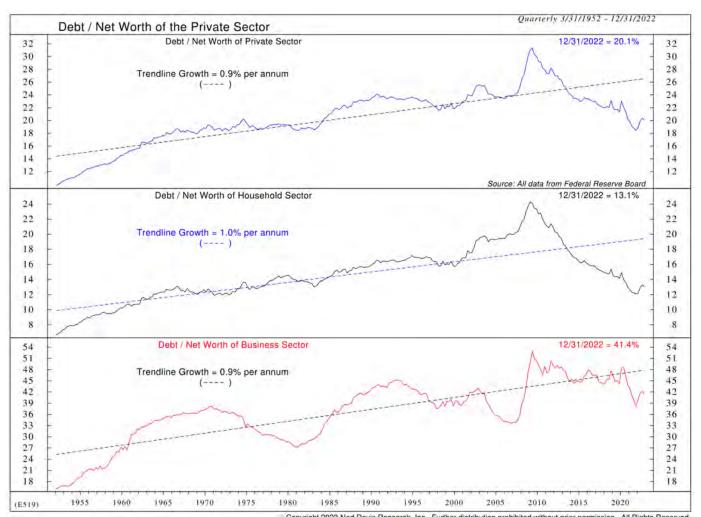

Balance Sheets





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The debt/net worth of the private sector (households and businesses) remains healthy, and far from the levels seen in previous recessions.

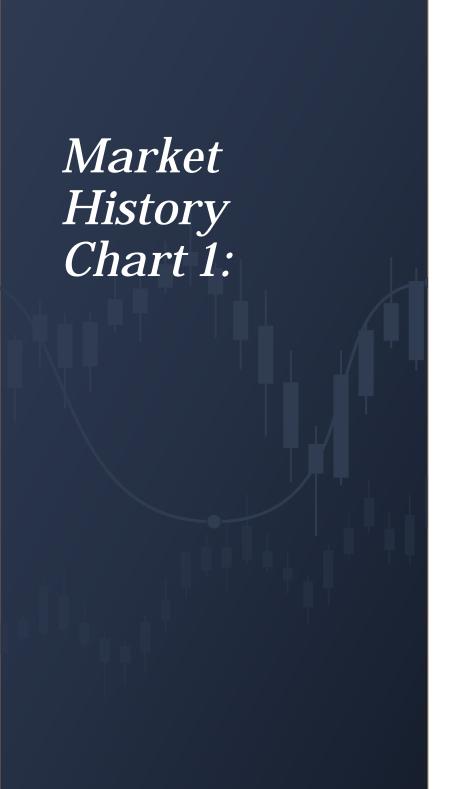
Businesses and consumers may have the capacity to take on higher interest rates.

In this case, Fed (Federal Reserve) rate hikes over the last year are less likely to cause a recession than if the private sector was in an unhealthy debt/net worth position.

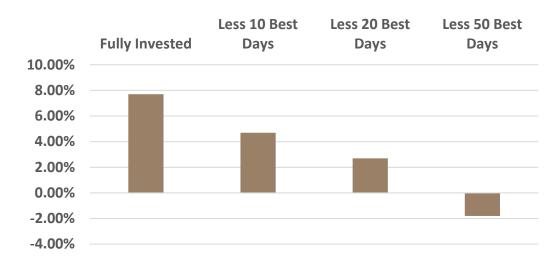

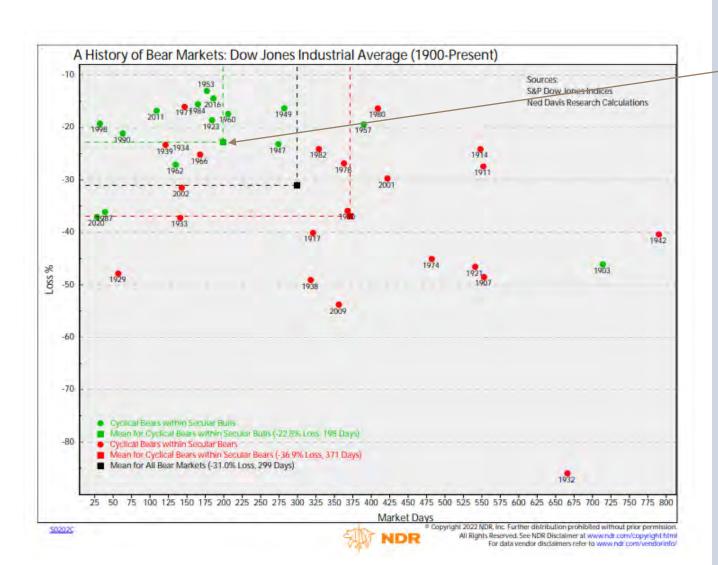
S&P 500 Compound Annual Growth Rate January 1, 1995 - September 30, 2022

Averages are calculated on the bottom left.

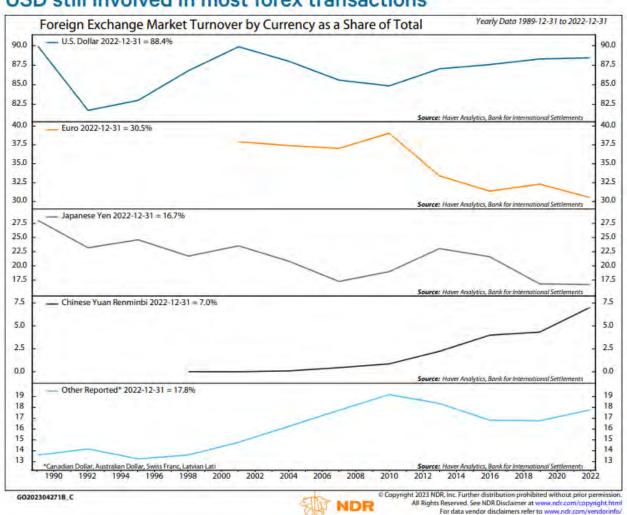
Green dots are associated with shallow bear markets, red dots with deep bear markets, and the black square is the average.

U.S. Dollar



USD still involved in most forex transactions



Questions have come up recently due to media attention on the prospects that the U.S. Dollar could lose its global currency reserve status.

This seems unlikely given that 88.4% of all forex transactions occur in U.S. Dollars.

Most countries do not have a relatively stable currency, freedom, democracy, transparent stock and bond markets, rule of law and enforced property rights like the U.S.

The best hedge long-term to fiat currencies, and government mismanagement might turn out to be Bitcoin (next slide).

Bitcoin, Cryptocurrency, and Blockchain Technology



Bitcoin as a monetary good.

Money is durable, divisible, fungible, portable, verifiable, and scarce.

Bitcoin possesses the scarcity and durability of gold, with the ease of use, storage, and transportability of fiat (even improving on it).

Only 21 million bitcoins will ever be created. Inflation rate is set, as opposed to Fiat, where no one knows the inflation rate.

It allows the oppressed, underbanked, and those around the world living in unstable currency or political regimes (over 80% of the world) to have more control of their life.
